

2014-'15 SY - Significant Progress:

- Implementing Common Core Standards, including extensive professional development for faculty, and introducing new reading, math and science curriculum.
- 13% increase in instructional time (225 minutes) for all students (Mahalo to the State Legislature though need funding support).
- Intervention classes 4 days a week for students struggling in reading and math.
- Free before— and after-school homework help w/ transportation and expanded summer school (incoming 4th-8th grades).
- Quarterly schoolwide assessments to monitor progress and extensive student data sharing with faculty.
- 3 hours 45 minutes weekly for teacher team collaboration focused on data-driven student academic needs in addition to individual teacher preparation time.
- Implementing Teacher Competency Model for professional development and evaluation.
- Instructional coaching support for teachers.
- Substantial 3-year Connecting For Success grant focused on students at high-risk for dropping out of high school including intense wrap-around supports and mentors for approx. 70 students.
- Consistently "clean" financial audits and significant progress with private donor fundraising.
- Legislatively authorized funding for 9-Classroom STEM building.

<u> Urgent Needs For Student Funding Equity:</u>

State Per Pupil Funding increased to \$8,000/child, plus support for Title 1 food service and transportation.

Waimea Middle School - Who We Are:

WMS was the first public school in Hawai'i to convert to a public charter under Act 2/2002. We received our charter in 2003 and are in our 12th year focused on what's best for our children based on a collaboratively crafted mission (see banner at top of page). We are the school of the community, accepting all 6th-8th graders in the geographic area regardless of need with approx. 290 students:

- √ 70% Free/Reduced Lunch
- √ 13% Special Education (IEP & 504)
- √ 9% ELL
- √ 20% Migrant Education
- √ 47% Native Hawaiian
- √ 10% Marshallese & Other Pacific Islanders
- √ 26 Certificated Teachers (92% Highly Qualified)

School Bus Fundraising

Sustainability — for Waimea Middle School — looks, sounds and smells like — a **BUS.** In fact, 2 buses. Simply put, WMS spends about \$150,000 a year on student busing and research tells us it would cost less <u>over the long haul</u> to own and operate our own buses. Also, doing so would enable us to save up to \$61,000 a year, and we could redirect these savings into the classroom to benefit student learning.

This is, in part, the rationale behind our **WASC Accreditation**



Recommendation to work toward a sustainable budget. There is no single "silver bullet" to resolve our fiscal challenges, but buying school buses is a significant first step. Toward this end, we have found two generous funders willing to help us move into high gear. The first is The Neilan Foundation, which underwrote our Accreditation celebration this past May. The event was free but donations were suggested to start our school bus

fund drive, and thanks to everyone's generosity, we raised \$732.85 that evening. Then, the Windermere Foundation voted to again make a \$2,000 donation to our school. Our Local Advisory Panel (LAP) then sponsored a "Take A LAP Fun Run/Walk," raising another \$8,000, and now, The Neilan Foundation has stepped forward and contributed the balance needed. Two new buses are on order to be delivered in time to launch our own bus service for Fall 2015.

We extend a warm mahalo to The Neilan Foundation, Windermere, LAP, and our students, families, faculty, staff and community for helping us get this ball (oops—bus) rolling!
