



Preparing for this Accreditation visit has been a two-year process involving every member of the WMS faculty and staff and also our **Ho'okako'o Local School Board, Local Advisory Panel (LAP)** and our families and students. All participated in an in-depth Self-Study that evaluates the effectiveness of the school's programs and operations to support high achievement of all students.

The Self-Study guided development of four schoolwide Action Plans that address: (1) Student Supports, (2) Curriculum Alignment, (3) Educational Technology and (4) Development and Resource Management.

During the visit, Accreditation team members will observe all classrooms, meet with faculty and staff members of the Self-Study's eight Focus Groups to discuss their research, findings and proposed Action Plans, and talk with students, families and community partners.

All WMS families, community partners and friends are invited to meet with the Accreditation Visiting Committee during the monthly LAP meeting from 4-6 p.m., Mon., March 31 in Classroom K-04. The meeting, chaired by community volunteer Dr. Kamana Beamer, will begin with a presentation by WMS 8th grade East Coast Travelers who will have just returned from an American History educational trip to Washington, D.C, New York City and Philadelphia.

Supporting WMS through the Accreditation process has been the **Hawai'i Association of Independent Schools** (HAIS) and Kamehameha Schools.
