	EMijjena said not all Marshallese parents know their child's teachers; she has told them to just call the office if they have questions or concerns.
	Brief discussion about possibly holding parent math nights for ELL students. Question: would families come? General agreement was "Yes" and would be more meaningful if someone there could help with interpretation. Also agreed one of the other essential ingredients for attracting families is providing childcare and food.
	Teacher reps recalled very successful ELL/MEP nights several years back.
	To help build attendance for the coming 12/3 ELL/MEP Family Night, WMS is asking families to bring a dish representative of their home country – school will purchase ingredients. Families seem excited/willing to do this; school/staff will fill in.

	Tier 3 Intervention - Reading Specialist*	Deep discussion about WMS students' reading challenges and how this impacts all core subjects; there is a direct correlation between reading proficiency and math and science proficiency. Comprehension is a challenge. This impacts about half of WMS students.
		Teacher reps noted that reading "gap" may be small in elementary but grows in middle school – painful; destroys self esteem and then they drop out in 10 th -11 th grades.
		"We have a morale imperative to help students catch up on reading."

	Teacher reps expressed concern that we (Hawaii) will probably see scores dive with new Smarter Balanced yearend assessment. Also noted that "test scores are not a true picture of the whole child; we are preparing them to be good citizens, too. All teachers take this seriously, not lackadaisical about scores."
	MHorne agreed we will watch how everyone in state and nation do and that this year cannot be compared to past HSA scores – this will be our new baseline, then next year we will watch for growth.
	Noted that testing grades are 3^{rd} , 5^{th} , 6^{th} , 7^{th} , 8^{th}
	PHurney asked if there was a computer-based program like ALEKS to help students prep for Smarter Balanced assessments? Teachers and MHorne explained that state hasn't released test yet — something like 14 states are waiting for this. However, teachers will pull up sample questions in classes to provide an opportunity for students to practice.
	Reference made to recent New York Times article criticizing "teaching to the test" and that "kids have ulcers over testing issues."
	Teacher reps reminded LAP about Accreditation's

	Schoolwide Learning Results that identify a broader range of skills the school values — academic profiency is a piece of this; can't stop teaching to practice for tests. Smarter Balanced is only one piece of
	evidence. Mentioned Star data and also student portfolios.
	Teacher reps also noted that Waimea's "cream" – top students – are skimmed off, it's not that families don't trust us for 6 th -8 th grades, but want to be sure their child has a chance to get into HPA, Parker or KS for high school, so transfer them into those schools in 6 th & 7 th grades –
	despite financial hardship. It is, for example, believed to be easier to get into KS in 7 th than 9 th grade.
	KVredenburg noted that some educational decisions have been driven by business; a lot of businesses recognized that today's workers don't sit by themselves, but rather, work in groups.
	JSherwood and Keawe both thought the new testing is contrary to this; that kids need to learn to work together and are doing so in classrooms and need to learn to recognize their own strengths and weaknesses; that it's important to learn HOW to solve the problem, not to just solve it.
	Brief mention that Hawai'i's DOE's and the legislative commitment to Common Core State Standards might

	be repealed. MHorne noted that Gov. Ige is not a Common Core fan.
	LLazarus said she doubted it would be repealed; Hawai'i has tried to be at leading edge because we get a rap about being "too easy."
	AKendziorski noted how challenging math is for our families – it's "off the charts for parents."
	CMiura agreed – can get answer but cannot explain how to do it. His wife can do it – "she's younger – it's how they think."
	Math used to be "formula driven" but now need to know "why."
	JSomerville explained some of the philosophy behind Singapore math — acknowledging it's "more conceptual."
	Brief discussion about need to get students out into the community, job shadowing – for example, in a vets office, store, etc., to understand that precision makes a difference – and that this would make math more relevant to students.
	JSomerville said she has an 8+-minute video about Singapore math process – "Why Math Is Different Now" – see link at end of these minutes. It's also posted on WMS website on the Curriculum/Math page.

 Sustainability Progress – School Buses & Vans teams are working on the recommendations with the help of a consultant, Natalie Nimmer.

BUSES: Bids secured on bus alternatives and decision made based on what most appropriate to meet school needs and long-term dependability to minimize R&M. Buses have been ordered; expected in 3-4 months, with funding support of The Neilan Foundation – everyone thanked GGimbel for this financial commitment.

MHorne will next be working w/ WTamaye and CKono/HC on plan for recruiting/training bus drivers.

VANS: Bids have been secured — will be matching 12-passenger Nissans. Research now in progress on process for turning them over to DOE for insurance and licensing. Hope to have them delivered by January-February, though West Coast dock slowdown may slow deliver.

• STEM Building Progress

Date for Bid Opening moved from mid-November to Dec. 19. School has retained services of consultant Ken Melrose to assist with project management, using funding provided by The Neilan Foundation. He has already made a huge difference in project by recommending the "staging area" be relocated south of the building to get noise, dust, big equipment as far away as possible from students, faculty, staff and the garden. He also assisted with meeting w/ DOE Facilities staff re: helping persuade them to (1) consider splitting electrical meter service on campus, (2) adding PV to new building, and (3) adding rainwater harvesting. He also helped persuade architects and engineers to relocate dust screen to reduce impact on Mala'ai garden.

Ho'okako'o Local School Board & Charter Update – Guy Kaulukukui, HC Interim Executive Director

a. Update on HC Strategic Planning MHorne also included Principal Effectiveness Survey In data link. Group agreed this link will not be posted on website at this time.

Deferred due to accidental fall by guest Pam Potter who stepped out to the restroom, and also due to running out of time.

MHorne: Accreditation Implementation should be a standing agenda item as WASC will require an annual report on school's progress.

PHurney asked whether students/families will continue to be charged fees for morning/evening transportation? MHorne said he didn't expect this to change, though it doesn't generate much income. Research done on running own transportation projected school paying for drivers, transportation management, fuel & R&M, with small income from families. Research concluded the school would save about \$50,000+ annually – funds that can go back into the classroom.
