

It's a new year...time for New Year's Resolutions. Here at WMS, this means higher expectations for all to achieve our mission of empowering all students with the skills, values and cultural understanding to successfully navigate high school and beyond.

All students attended assemblies last week to discuss 2nd Semester Behavior Expectations to "live" our I KAIR core values and achieve the following goals:

- Every classroom is a <u>place of learning for all students</u>.
- Every student is <u>on-task and respectful</u> in classrooms and all areas of the school
- There is a <u>positive culture and pride</u> in all areas of the school

Rules To Be Followed <u>Everywhere</u> in School (from Student Planner):

- 1. Attend school regularly, wear my WMS uniform and be on time
- 2. Show respect for myself, my peers, and my school staff
- 3. Obey school rules and demonstrate good behavior
- 4. <u>Do my best</u> in my classes
- 5. Bring the necessary school supplies to school and complete assignments on time
- 6. Believe that I can learn and be the best person that I can be

Rules To Be Followed in All Classrooms (most from Tribes curriculum):

- 1. Follow the entry-routine in every classroom including taking out your planner
- 2. Listen carefully and follow all directions Attentive Listening
- Respect students and staff by maintaining an <u>atmosphere of learning</u> Mutual Respect And Appreciations/No Put-Downs
- 4. Stay focused on learning, work hard and ask for help if you need it Right to Pass
- 5. Be organized and use all class time wisely

Updated Discipline Policy

Offense	Typical First Consequence for Incident	Repeated or Intentional Offenses/Additional Consequence
Planner Warnings-Class D 3 warnings per day	Detention-30 minutes for 3 60 minutes for 4 warnings	5 or more planner warnings will be recorded as a Class D referral.
Referrals Class D	Detention-45-100 minutes & Restorative Actions	Detention Increased by 90 minutes for each related infraction within 30 calendar days. Suspension possible for intentional and/or repeated behaviors.
Referrals Class C	Detention-100-200 minutes & Restorative Actions	Detention Increased by 90 minutes for each related infraction within 30 calendar days. Suspension possible for intentional and/or repeated behaviors.
Referrals Class B	Detention-150-300 minutes & Restorative Actions	Detention Increased by 90 minutes for each related infraction within 30 calendar days. Suspension possible for intentional and/or repeated behaviors.
Referrals Class A	1 or more day suspension & Restorative Actions	Suspension increased for each related violation within 30 calendar days. Removal possible for intentional and/or repeated behaviors.

Parent/Guardian Contact and Conference with Student will be conducted for all referrals processed by Administration.

Each individual case is subject to discretion from the above chart on an as needed basis and may include any of the disciplinary actions outlined in Chapter 19. Detention is held daily during recess and lunch, for a maximum of 45 minutes per day. After-school detention and Saturday School are possible options for students with repeated infractions.

If students are suspended after 11:00 am, the suspension may be continued through the next school day.

BEHAVIOR REFERRALS:

- Will be written when behavior interferes with learning or interferes with the safe, positive school climate.
- Extended detention and suspension will be assigned as consequences along with restorative actions to help right the wrong.
- Any repeat offenses may result in more severe detention or suspension, parent conferences, Saturday School, after-school service time, removal of privileges or required parent support in school and during school activities.



Students Listen Intently About Both Positive Rewards And 'Saturday School'

PLANNER POSITIVES:

- Will be given for demonstrating I KAIR Core Values.
- Each 5 Positives earns (1) a prize, (2) an I KAIR entry into assembly drawings <u>and</u> (3) one script for Ho'olaule'a at the end of the year!

PLANNER WARNINGS:

- Will be given as reminders for breaking any of the school or classroom rules.
- 3 Planner Warnings in one day earn detention and 5 Warnings earn a more severe Behavior Referral.
- All staff will be more diligent about issuing Planner Warnings now that we're in 2nd Semester.

Re-enactment of 'Ka Lei Maile Ali'i - The Queen's Women'

Students & Community Commemorate A Significant, Almost Forgotten, Moment In Hawaiian History


Thousands of Hawaiians throughout the Islands signed the Ku'e petition in 1897 to protest annexation. Petition documents were lost for many years but found in the National Archives and brought home and this story has became a one-act play that re-enacts a historical meeting in Hilo in 1897. This play was presented for students, families and community friends last week – almost to the day coinciding with the anniversary of Kingdom of Hawai'i's annexation.

White placards were created bearing the names of those who signed the petition from this part of Hawai'i Island, and they were displayed on the front lawn of Kahilu Town Hall by our students and community to honor these kupuna and their love and loyalty to the Queen and Hawaiian Kingdom.
