WMS: Striving High & Adding Foundational Supports

By now, every news outlet in the state has announced the release yesterday of Hawai'i's new STRIVE HI educational performance system to measure and drive continuous public school improvement.

At WMS, we are please that our score puts us in the "Continuous Improvement" step along with about 75% of the schools in the state. Yes, we have lots of work to do together students, families, teachers and staff - but our students are "growing" academically, which is important progress.

So what is Strive HI all about? In a nutshell, this is the new accountability "tool" for Hawai'i public schools that replaces No **Child Left Behind**, which didn't do students or schools justice. Strive HI was crafted by a large number of educators – based on nationally proven best practices -- to measure student and school achievement, individual student growth and "readiness," and narrowing the achievement gap. Put more simply, Strive HI

gives students, families. teachers and school leaders a clearer picture of students' academic progress: Are students learning?


new plans being developed to fulfill the school's vision of "empowering all students with the skills, values and cultural understanding to successfully navigate high school and beyond."

'Ka 'Ike Kupuna – The Vast Knowledge of Our Elders' Talk Stories During September

"Time is of the essence" is a phrase most have heard before and can be applicable in many contexts. Waimea Middle School's 'Ike Hawai'i Program, in partnership with Paniolo Preservation Society (PPS) and the Waimea Education Hui, will feature three classes in the month of September that take that phrase to heart.

Kupuna-paniolo and founding member of PPS, **Sonny Keakealani**, will share the vast knowledge he holds of Hawaiian terms used by the paniolo reflecting his connection from the mountain to the sea. Topics will highlight *hua 'olelo*, or words and phrases, used to describe storied places, place names, lifestyle and traditions. Each class will be opened with *ha'i mo'olelo*

(stories) tied to Waimea, shared by **Ku'ulei Keakealani**. The art of storytelling is a gift and skill instilled in Ku'ulei by her kupuna.

Those who participate in this class will be asked to make a personal commitment to utilize the Hawaiian terms shared at each class so the 'ike (knowledge) of today will continue tomorrow...and beyond.

Highlight Of Open House: Seeing How WMS Students Made A Difference 10,000 Miles Away!

Toward the end of last school year and into summer, WMS students made more than 300 bracelets of kukui nuts on woven hau cordage as a way of conveying unity with and support for members of the **Dakota Nation** who were making a **Unity Ride**

from Canada along the Hudson River valley by land and river to the United Nations in New York City as a journey of peace and healing.

While the Unity Ride seems very different and distant from Waimea, the student's gesture of aloha and cultural exchange continued what was started by WMS Social Studies and 'Ike Hawai'i teachers to make connections and bring relevance to studying the **Indian Relocation Act**, which is an essential part of 8th grade Social Studies lessons on **American History**. To make the Indian Relocation Act relevant, WMS teachers sought out ways to connect their students by exploring how something like the Relocation Act continues to have impact today – as manifested in the Unity Ride. Teachers also wanted Waimea students to compare and contrast their own stories and history with that of the Native American Unity Riders.

A highlight of Wednesday's **Open House** will be a brief film "concluding" this learning connection as our students' adornments were presented to Unity Riders in New York. **No question:** Our students made a difference!
