Planting Seeds For Change...

Though headed back to Washington, D.C. this Friday to focus on intense Congressional discussion of America's response to the human tragedies in Syria, U.S. Sen. Brian Schatz made time to visit WMS and our school garden yesterday – a second visit in two weeks.

The earlier visit was with representatives of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to ensure continued funding for unexploded ordnance cleanup in the Waimea-Waikoloa area including our campus. Yesterday's visit was to talk with school and garden staff and volunteers about the importance of the hands-on health-wellness lessons our students experience in Mala'ai as our teachers "connect the dots" between science, language arts, math and social studies as well as cultural and environmental lessons with the world around them.

It was a lively discussion, ranging from how to achieve systemic change to enable more fresh, locally grown or produced foods to be included in school lunches, to asking Sen. Schatz to extend a personal invitation to Mrs.

Michelle Obama to visit Mala'ai as "the model middle school garden" in Hawai'i. (He said it's a complicated "ask" but not entirely out of the question.)

Mahalo, too, to Sen. Schatz and his staff.

In addition to a close look at Mala'ai and the challenging but essential work our teachers and staff are doing there in partnership with The Kohala Center and private funders including Mrs. Murray's foundation, the conversation with Sen. Schatz also addressed equitable federal and state funding for public charter schools and also the school's goal of including "learning lab" features in the new 9-classroom Science-Technology building such as a complete photo voltaic system designed to both reduce energy consumption and expenditures, and also enable students to monitor and possibly manage energy consumption and reduce waste in the new building.

Following the school visit, WMS cohosted a community talk-story with Sen. Schatz that was attended by nearly 100 Waimea/North Hawai'i residents.



Waimea Middle School's 'lke Hawai'i Program works closely with core curriculum teachers to provide place-based lessons focused on rigor, relevance and relationships that connect culture to curriculum and tradition to technology.

Paniolo Preservation Society's mission is to preserve and perpetuate Hawai'i's unique ranching heritage, practices and traditions. This includes sharing all aspects with present and future generations through educational events and activities as well as honoring those who continue to "live" the paniolo life.

Waimea Education Hui is an informal network of mostly Waimea-North Hawai'i schools – public, public charter and private – as well as community organizations and individuals that have joined together to create and share culturally relevant lessons and experiences that nurture a "sense of place and identity" for the next generation to arm them with the skills, values and cultural understanding to become thoughtful leaders and stewards of the land and Hawai's natural resources in years to come.

"Time is of the essence" is a phrase most have heard before and can be applicable in many contexts. Waimea Middle School's 'Ike Hawai'i Program, in partnership with Paniolo Preservation Society (PPS) and the Waimea Education Hui, will feature three classes in the month of September that take that phrase to heart.

Kupuna-paniolo and founding member of PPS, Sonny Keakealani, will share the vast knowledge he holds of Hawaiian terms used by the paniolo reflecting his connection from the mountain to the sea. Topics will highlight hua 'olelo, or words and phrases, used to describe storied places, place names, lifestyle and traditions.

Each class will be opened with ha'i mo'olelo (stories) tied to Waimea, shared by Ku'ulei Keakealani. The art of storytelling is a gift and skill instilled in Ku'ulei by her kupuna.

Those who participate in this class will be asked to make a personal commitment to utilize the Hawaiian terms shared at each class so the 'ike (knowledge) of today will continue tomorrow...and beyond.
